It is with both relief and pleasure I write that Ambury Park Centre, apart from a few restrictions, is operating as



normal. The atmosphere is positive amongst all, with all programmes off to a good start. The students and adult clients returned full time with enthusiasm, with therapy rider numbers building back steadily, and community activities opening again for the adult clients. The students too are venturing back into the community. Other positives are that the grass is lushly green again supporting the health of our horses including three recent arrivals that Equine will describe. Usually in March we hold the Ambury Park Centre car boot/gala day but unfortunately this year a decision had to be made to postpone early in the year, when outdoor numbers were Covid restricted. The board is grateful for the generosity of our charitable and community trusts and other donors throughout these times that helped keep this unique Centre going and thriving. We continue to be so very grateful to our volunteers without whom we would not be able to offer what we do, especially in riding therapy and Ambury events when they are occur.

Sadly, Vicky resigned from her position as Director/Principal effective as of the end of Term 1. Vicky is now living further from the Centre and wished to have more time for her two sons. We thank Vicky hugely for her innovation and mahi for Ambury. She brought energy and vibrancy to the Centre, dedication to supporting all programmes, care for the students and clients, and the horses. Kinsella: An Ambury Legacy

It is with a heavy heart that I fare welled Kinsella on the 7th of March at the age of 36.

Kinsella's passing marks the end of a legacy. He was the last of the Connemara Ponies bred specifically for riding therapy through the generous donation of a stallion (Chiltern Sunsilk) and a couple of mares (Irish Mist and Bonnie Jean) to Ambury Park, from Sir John and Lady Marshall back in the 1980's. Of the foals born, Ambury Kinsella, Ambury Rising Sun (Cloudy), Ambury Summer Dawn, Ambury Holly, Ambury Gift, and Ambury Meteor (Dawn's son) ended up at Ambury Park due to suitability of temperament. (There was also O'Jon, not bred as part of the Trust but the offspring of Chiltern Sunsilk and a Clydesdale mare owned by a long-time supporter of Ambury Park.) The fact that seven foals 'made it' fulfilled the vision of the Marshall's and the late Dr Jill Calvely, first Director of Ambury Park.

Kinsella was the only one to spend his whole working life at Ambury Park - the others came to riding therapy after gaining experience in the general horse world and quickly became an integral part of a very select band of therapy

horses. They worked right through until age, unsoundness or illness caught up with them, all reaching their 20's (with the exception of Meteor, who didn't make it to old age due to colic.) Kinsella really did leave a huge mark - 30yrs giving so much to staff, students and therapy riders.

Kinsella was named by one of the therapy riders and was a character from day one. Once he was 'broken in' he was leased to a pony club family to experience life before coming to Ambury Park to be a therapy horse. Kinsella's

character and strong personality was too much for the family, so he came to Ambury Park much earlier than originally planned as he was oh so naughty! Kinsella had an exceptionally powerful jump - no fence was too big for him. He was incredibly brave, but one of his quirks was to buck on landing, especially when putting in extra effort to clear the jump. If the rider wasn't ready for this, they'd be brushing sand off their jodhpurs!

His excellent rhythm in all paces made him a suitable horse for vaulting. The suspension in his trot and canter helped the students to vault on --- although if you missed sitting into the correct place he would 'help' you by putting in a little buck or two! As he was so good on the lunge, he was the 'go to' horse for teaching students the rising trot. There won't be many students who came to Ambury Park who didn't learn their rising trot on Kinsella. Due to being voice trained he was often the students' first canter as he would pop into it with such great ease.

He retired sound and well but after nearly 30yrs being handled and ridden by so many different people he was 'over it'. His personality stayed with him right to the very end. There was a certain glint in his eye that said, 'watch out, I'm about to leave', and if you didn't listen ---- he did, 36 years old or not! Kinsella gave his all to riding therapy and now he is finally able to fly free with his other 'horsey friends and relatives'. I am sure he will have been met at the 'Rainbow Bridge' by his great mate Fred who between the two of them kept us amused for hours as they reared, bucked and ran together in their Ambury Park paddock. 

In addition to English, Mathematics, and Te Kura Correspondence courses, new in 2022 is a Practical Science programme for all students focused on their individual learning level.

This year we have had the opportunity to take many educational and fun visits as part of our EOTC programme. Dear clients/ riders and family and whanau,
