FROM THE PRESIDENT Gaynor Brown

Tena Koutou Katoa, Greetings to All

Ambury Park Centre began positively in 2021 with good numbers in all programmes - Riding Therapy, the Secondary School, and the Vocational Training. The February and March Covid 19 Level lockdown saw the staff readily slot back into the familiar routine as essential workers for the horses. The teachers and vocational staff communicated with and provided learning opportunities for the students and clients.

The first attempt for Ambury's car boot/gala day was a Covid 19 postponement but on March 20 it was held on a perfect, sunny autumn day. It was again a festive occasion with live music, numerous Ambury stalls, more car boot bookings and activities, and the ever-popular horse rides. The occasion had crowds to match,

which was wonderful given that the proceeds go towards students and the adults taking part in community experiences. The Centre's staff and volunteers are to be commended for their great efforts before, during and after the event. The Ambury volunteers are a treasure for the Centre with their support with fundraising events, not to mention for our Equine therapy programmes.

The year before last a Horse Welfare committee of board members and equine staff was formed to assess our herd of horses with a view to rejuvenating it. This has been highly successful to date in bringing about 10 younger horses into the herd and retiring others to ideal settings. We have been very fortunate with funding for horses from trusts and whanau. Really good things happen at Ambury. Another is the professional development. Ambury Park Centre has had staff professional development days with a focus on better understanding of what our clients and students present with and how best to support them behaviourally, emotionally and socially. Sessions have been facilitated by experts in the fields. Three Equine staff are enrolled for the two-year coach training qualification with NZRDA. Two are current coaches and the other is the Head of Equine. In Equine therapy the Intensive therapist continues to further develop her skills in Hippotherapy, a valuable adjunct in Equine therapy. Marjolein joined a three-day online conference from the US. The Professional learning is most beneficial for the Centre.

There is more. Ongoing support in the school from the Centre for Youth Health and visits from an MOE psychologist impacts the students physical and mental well-being. Through the pandemic the Centre was able to engage with SEED Consultancy, through MOE funding, to guide development for the new Digital Curriculum. The Sutherland Trust funded 10 laptops for the school. Vicky, our Director/Principal, has been proactive in seeking all the wonderful supports mentioned. Thank you, Vicky.

The board and staff are deeply grateful for the grants and donations from our many supporting trusts,

friends of the Centre and whanau that help make Ambury Park Centre the success it is.

Very recently the Centre procured a smart replacement for one of its vans. The board is very thankful to the Mangere Market Trust for funding this much needed vehicle. Yet another positive, is that Elizabeth Warden who left Ambury about two years ago to travel initially, is returning as the Head of School and teacher of English. We are delighted to welcome Elizabeth back.

After a bumpy start to 2021 with two lockdowns before we had even got going with our programmes, it seems like those worries are behind us. I am extremely proud of the way that staff, students and clients displayed their resiliency and ability to be flexible during our lockdowns. We grew as a Centre, as a team, and showed that we can face anything when we work together.

Thankfully the rest of the year has continued smoothly, and it has been a settled time at the Centre. The programmes are all running well, and our clients, students and riders are flourishing.

The school currently has a roll of 25 students, all of whom are making progress in their programmes. We have recently welcomed 5 new students to the school, and they have settled in well. This year we are focussing on getting back on track with academic studies and NCEA after a disruptive 2020. Students are following their goals through their Individual Educational Plans and, for some, developing a plan for transitioning into their community post APC. We are looking forward to Elizabeth Warden returning to the role of Head of School on 21st June.

An on-going success in the school is the engagement of Centre for Youth Health, which provides a nurse for Ambury once a week. We have also recently engaged a counsellor, Jazmine, once a week. This has allowed us to provide a holistic support for the student, including their physical and mental well-being.

The Vocational Programme have been working hard on the farm – their gardens are looking fantastic. Please do take some time to admire them when you visit. Each client has their own focus and we are all enjoying the produce that is being made into scrumptious café meals. The clients even had a wonderful Farmer's Market at the car boot sale, selling their produce.

The Riding for Disabled programme continues to excel under Marjolein, Katja and Ashleigh. Our new horses have settled well into their work and are being enjoyed by our riders. Thank you to our riders and their families who have this year contributed to the cost of new horses and new rugs, so our ponies stay warm and dry.

In terms of property, the centre has been well maintained this year. We are extremely grateful to Mangere Market for their kind donation to fund our new van.

Ambury Park Centre continues to be a place where children and adults, who are challenged by the world around them, can find a place to grow in confidence, to build friendships and become more resilient to the world around them.
